

Many opportunities are available to students who are seeking financial aid to continue their education beyond high school. Federal and state governments, private and public resources, as well as individual colleges and universities; All offer a variety of options which assist with financing post-secondary education.

The Okeechobee High School Career Center provides current information on scholarships that are available through local sources. This booklet is intended to supplement already published information on financial aid from state and national sources. The Career Center and the financial aid office at the institution to which you are applying for admission will be happy to answer questions and explore possible programs for financial assistance.

Instructions For Applying For Local Scholarships

Scholarship applications are the responsibility of the individual student. The student must assemble an application packet for each scholarship for which he/she applies. The application packet should include: The application form, an academic summary (transcript), a resume, personal statement, and two letters of recommendation. The application packets should be in *clearly labeled manila envelopes (9"x12"*). Each envelope should include the name of the local scholarship and the student's name. **Include only **one (1)** Local Scholarship Verification sheet with your packets (located in the back of this booklet.)

Checklist For Local Scholarships

- Complete the local scholarship application. (To avoid any delays or disqualifications, answer **all** questions.)
- Copy of academic summary transcript (See Mrs. Vlkojan in the guidance office.)
- Personal statement.
- Student resume.
- Two letters of recommendation (no more than one recommendation from high school teachers/staff.)
- Read the OHS Scholarship Directory, in the back of this booklet, for all local scholarships.
- Identify the scholarships for which you will apply.
- Pay close attention to the special conditions of each scholarship.
- Arrange for copies of the applications to be made.
- Label each application packet clearly on a manila envelope and put your name on the packet. (See above)
- Mrs. Tabbert's packet: Make a copy of your completed packet and include the Scholarship Verification Sheet. Mrs. Tabbert's packet is due to her by **Feb. 24**th.
- Do things timely. All <u>deadlines</u> must be met.

Local Application Deadline: March 3rd

All local applications must be in the office of Mrs. Tabbert, Career Specialist by 3:30 p.m.

OHS Local Scholarship Instructions

- A. Attach your current academic summary/transcript showing your complete scholastic record.
- B. Personal statement. (one page typed) May include, but is not limited to the following information:
 - 1. Who you are.
 - 2. Career plans
 - 3. What has happened in your life.
 - 4. Personal information about yourself.
 - 5. The need for this scholarship. What makes you stand out as a scholarship recipient?
- C. Submit a personal resume (one page typed) which may include the information listed below:
 - Education including any AP, Honors, Dual Enrollment, CTE classes
 - 2. Honors and Awards
 - 3. Clubs and Activities include any leadership roles
 - 4. Community Service Name of organization and your role
 - 5. Sports
 - 6. Employment
 - 7. Personal Interests
- Included in a Separate 9"x12" Envelope as Shown Below. Do Not Seal Envelopes! D. Submit two (2) letters of recommendation (Give at least two (2) weeks notice for letters of recommendation). These should attest to your moral character, involvement in outside activities, and scholastic abilities. One (1) recommendation must be from an individual other than school personnel. No family members are eligible to write a letter of recommendation.

E. Submit one Scholarship Verification Sheet with a copy of your packet to Mrs. Tabbert. Title this packet "Mrs. Tabbert" in place of the scholarship name.

F. REMEMBER: LATE APPLICATIONS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

Federal Financial Aid Programs

Grants

Unlike loans, do not have to be repaid. Must fill out Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

Federal Pell Grant

Pell Grants are awarded usually only to undergraduate students who have not earned a bachelor's or a professional degree. Pell Grants are considered a foundation of federal financial aid.

How much can I get?

The maximum Pell Grant award for the 2013-14 award year (July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2016) may be \$5,550.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG)

The Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant program is for undergraduates with exceptional financial need. Pell Grant recipients with the lowest expected family contributions (EFCs) will be considered first for a FSEOG.

How much can I get?

You can receive between \$100 and \$5,000 a year, depending on when you apply, your financial need, the funding at the school you're attending, and the policies of the financial aid office at your school.

If I am eligible, how will I get the FSEOG money?

If you're eligible, your school will credit your account, pay you directly (usually by check), or combine these methods. Your school must pay you at least once per term (semester, trimester, or quarter).

Academic Competitiveness Grant

The Academic Competitiveness Grant award is in addition to the student's Pell Grant award.

How much can a student receive?

An Academic Competitiveness Grant will provide up to \$750 for the first year of undergraduate study and up to \$1,300 for the second year of undergraduate study to full-time students who are eligible for a Federal Pell Grant and who had successfully completed a rigorous high school program.

Federal Work-Study (FWS)

Federal Work-Study (FWS) provides part-time jobs for undergraduate and graduate students with financial need, allowing them to earn money to help pay education expenses. The program encourages community service work and work related to the recipient's course of study. You'll be paid by the hour if you're an undergraduate.

Stafford Loans (FFELs and Direct Loans)

In addition to Perkins Loans, the U.S. Department of Education administers the Federal Family Education Loan (FFEL) Program and the William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan (Direct Loan) Program. Both the FFEL and Direct Loan programs consist of what are generally known as Stafford Loans (for students) and PLUS Loans (for parents).

Schools generally participate in either the FFEL or Direct Loan program but sometimes participate in both. Under the Direct Loan Program, the funds for your loan come directly from the federal government. Funds for your FFEL will come from a bank, credit union, or other lender that participates in the program. Eligibility rules and loan amounts are identical under both programs, but repayment plans differ somewhat.

How can I get a FFEL or Direct Loan?

For either type of loan, you must fill out a FAFSA. After your FAFSA is processed, your school will review the results and will inform you about your loan eligibility. You also will have to sign a promissory note, a binding legal document that lists the conditions under which you're borrowing and the terms under which you agree to repay your loan.

The question of whether a loan is subsidized or unsubsidized comes down to who pays the interest while you are in school. <u>Subsidized</u> Stafford loans are need-based, and the government pays the interest on these loans while you are in school, during a six-month grace period immediately preceding repayment, and during authorized deferment. <u>Unsubsidized</u> Stafford loans are not need-based, and you are responsible for all of the interest that accrues on the loan, including while you are in school.

Federal Perkins Loans

A Federal Perkins Loan is a low-interest (5 percent) loan for both undergraduate and graduate students with exceptional financial need. Federal Perkins Loans are made through a school's financial aid office. Your school is your lender, and the loan is made with government funds. You must repay this loan to your school. Your school will either pay you directly (usually by check) or apply your loan to your school charges. You'll receive the loan in at least two payments during the academic year.

How much can I borrow? You can borrow up to \$4,000 for each year of undergraduate. The amount you receive depends on when you apply, your financial need, and the funding level at the school.

When do I pay it back? If you're attending school at least half time, you have nine months after you graduate, leave school, or drop below half-time status before you must begin repayment.

Definitions

Terms you should know when applying for financial aid.

Scholarship – Financial aid usually based on academic merit or achievement that does not have to be repaid.

Grant - Financial aid usually based on financial need that does not have to be repaid

Loan – Financial aid that must be repaid. Loan programs have varying repayment provisions.

Scholarship Loan – Financial aid that must be repaid in cash or by some type of service rendered. Repayment provisions vary by program.

Work-Study – Jobs that enable students to earn a portion of school costs through employment.

Need-Based Assistance – The term "need," as used in financial aid, usually refers to the difference between the resources available to the student (from parents, student savings and summer jobs) and the student's cost of education.

Need Analysis – The process evaluates the demonstrated need of an applicant for financial aid. The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) must be submitted for this process to be completed.

Budget – The total cost of attending a postsecondary institution for one academic year. The student's budget usually includes tuition, fees, room, board, books, supplies, travel and personal expenses. Each institution figures its own student budget.

Financial Aid "Package" – A package is a combination of grants, loans, and work funds. Post-secondary institutions use it as a tool to meet the financial need of each student in the most effective way possible.

Self-Help – The portion of the college budget that the student is expected to provide usually through earnings from summer and part-time jobs, student savings and other student assets.

EFC-Expected Family Contribution – The amount which parents should be reasonably expected to provide toward meeting the costs of post-secondary education added to the student's assets and benefits (Self-Help).

FAFSA-Free Application for Federal Student Aid – The application that is necessary to apply for Federal Student Financial Aid programs. The FAFSA is also used for state and college aid and is based on financial need. Start applying as soon as possible after January 1 of the current year. Go to https://fafsa.ed.gov/.

Alternatives Financial Aid

The following suggestions may help you decrease the cost of your post-secondary education:

- Cooperative Education Programs (Cooperative Work Programs) enable a student to alternate attending college with working. The benefits are threefold: Working helps pay for college, you gain valuable work experience in your chosen field, and you will be able to give employers letters of recommendation.
- ROTC and military academies will pay for part or all of your educational expenses. (There are enlistment programs that will also help.)
- Many Employers offer Scholarships. Check with your or your parents' employers.
- Many social, professional or religious organizations, unions, etc. offer scholarships.
- Some colleges have lower housing and board costs because they require their students to share work on the campus.
- CLEP tests provide college credit without tuition fees. (Check to be sure the college will accept it.)
